LATEST KALOGRAMS.

ST. THOMAS STATION.
GENERAL NEWS.
New York, 7th Oct.—From India it is stated that the British forces have captured the fort of Ali Musjid in the Khyber Pass in anticipation of the movement on Afghanistan.
Constantinople advices intimate that the Turkish Government delays the introduction in Asia Minor of the administrative reforms proposed by England.
In Official circles, it is current that Italy is seeking to obtain in Egypt an influence similar to that held by France and England.
The deaths are announced of Lord Chelmsford and Sir Francis Grant, P. R. A.

New York, 8th October.—From India it is reported that the British forces have gained further successes on the Afghan frontier.
The English Cabinet has abandoned the idea of making the Afghan difficulty an Imperial question and decided to leave the matter to be dealt with by the Indian Authorities.
Austria despatches announce that the resignation of the Ministry has been accepted, but at the Emperor's request, they will remain in Office until a new Cabinet is formed.
The death is reported of Mr. G. H. Whalley, M. P. for Peterborough.

New York, 9th October.—From India it is announced that the British attack on the Khyber Pass has been deferred, and that there Ali is massing his troops on the frontier.
In Hungary it is dreaded that the complications arising out of the occupation of Bosnia may lead to actual war between Turkey and Austria.
The French Government is about despatching a powerful fleet to the Mediterranean in anticipation of troubles between Turkey and Greece.
President MacMahon has appointed the twenty seventh instant for the meeting of the Senatorial Electoral colleges and the elections are to take place on the fifth January.

Intelligence from Copenhagen states that a stormy discussion took place in the Danish Chambers on Monday and it is predicted that the majority will defeat every Government measure.
London despatches report that a disastrous storm passed over Great Britain yesterday.
From Constantinople it is announced that the Russians will retain Adrianople until the Berlin treaty is fulfilled.

We are indebted to Captain Cowell of the Quebec and Gulf Ports S. S. "Bahama" for the following notes:—

"I sailed from New York at 8h 20m p. m. on 28th inst., and light easterly winds and fine clear weather up to a. m. 29th instant, when we got strong gales and squally weather and heavy sea, when I began to watch for a coming Hurricane. Aneroid 29.670 Thermometer 80°. Lat. 34° N., Long. 72° W., 1st October, Lat. 34° 52' N., Long. 71° 21' W., Aneroid 29.650, Thermometer 81°. Strong gales from E. N. E. Centre of hurricane S. S. E. and should be travelling N. E. or E. N. E. kept on same course.

2nd October Lat. 32° 47' N., Long. 70° 47' W., Aneroid 29.710, Thermometer 81°. Heavy gales from E. N. E. and heavy cross sea.

3rd October Lat. 30° 24' N., Long. 70° 29' W., Aneroid 29.800 Thermometer 82°. Terrible sea and heavy gales; have overboard all deck and cabin cargo to save ourselves and ship, wind E. N. E., NE—thinking that the centre of the gale was to be passing N. E. or E. N. E. I kept off to S. W. to let it have plenty room to pass us; 10h p. m. Aneroid 28.800; 10h p. m. moderated to a very light breeze from N. E. and at 11h p. m. the sea was flat and calm all gone down and we went full speed on our course, mid—wind S. S. E. light and foggy.

4th October, 4h a. m. strong gales from E. S. E. 8h a. m. heavy gales from S. W. and terrible sea, obliged to keep ship up and slow engine. Noon Lat. 29° 49' N., Long. 70° 26' W. Aneroid 29.200, Thermometer 81°. 4h p. m. 4th October Aneroid 29.400 rising slow gale still very heavy with wind blowing from S. W.; 8h p. m. Aneroid 29.500. Gale moderating with less sea, engine stopped to repair pumps; 9h p. m. kept away on our course for Saint Thomas. Midnight Aneroid 29.600 strong gales and heavy sea, A. M. 5th at 5 o'clock strong breezes from W. N. W. and clear, Aneroid 29.800; set all square sails.

The W. I. and Panama Telegraph Company's Steamer "Investigator" arrived here at noon Sunday, having completed the repairs of the cables between St. Kitts and St. Thomas and St. Kitts and Antigua. She left the following day to repair the St. Thomas-San Juan section.

We learn from Tortola that from certain suspicious circumstances, 9 persons were arrested on the 6th instant, from a fishing boat, found drifting in Drake's Channel, and other 9 persons were taken into custody, on the 7th instant, at Virgin Gorda—in all, 18 persons who had fled from St. Croix, where they were employed on the Estate *Betty's Hope*.

We learn that an investigation will be immediately instituted.

At the services, held on Sunday at the various denominational Churches, reference was made to the riot in our sister Island of Santa Cruz, and the charity of the benevolent was appealed to for pecuniary assistance, by way of subscriptions, to alleviate the distress occasioned thereby. We trust that our community, providential for its philanthropy will respond promptly and liberally to so worthy a cause.

Is another column will be found an appeal from the Ladies' Relief Committee to the public. The generosity shown by our townsmen in their large subscriptions yesterday will we are sure not stop there, and we hope the kind ladies who have given their patronage will have as much work to do in distributing to the needy, as they possibly can.

From the *Acis* we learn that on the 30th September the Colonial Bank, at St. Croix, closed its doors. It had, says our esteem, virtually ceased to be an institution in that island since the end of December 1875, when it discontinued its business there, and when even the depositors were obliged to withdraw their deposits. But the doors were still kept open for the collection of debts. That work has now been transferred to the St. Thomas branch.

ST. CROIX.

The Danish schooner *Petrel*, arrived here yesterday from Fredricksted, St. Croix, bringing about forty passengers, most of whom are sufferers by the late riot. We have spoken to some of them who informed us that the distress is great and that provisions are scarce and dear.

(From the *St. Thomas Lloyd's*, 7th instant.)
We have been authorised to publish the following extract from a telegram sent by the Commander of the "Labourdonnais" to the French Consul here:—
"Situation Meilleure. Insurrection Decroissante."

We learn that last night the estate "Betty's Hope," was burnt. The *Arno* arrived last night from Bassin, bringing a few passengers and returned again at one o'clock.

The following telegram received by us at 1 p. m. from our Special Correspondent, we are glad to say, is quieting, and it is with pleasure that we lay it before our readers:—
"If anything important will advise—Prisoners coming in hourly and all quieting down."

"All well. Court martial commences to-day."
The above private telegram, was received at 10 o'clock this morning and kindly placed at our disposal.

LATER.
(From the *West India & Panama Telegraph Co.*)
ST. CROIX, 7th October.—In St. Croix confidence is restored and business was resumed in Bassin this morning. The Total number of estates destroyed is estimated at sixty but many of the works have escaped destruction. Twenty estates are unharmed.

The rioters have taken to the hills on the extreme north-west side.
The rest of the Islands quiet.
Fires were reported on the north-west side on Saturday night and the negro village of Betty's Hope was fired yesterday afternoon. Only one planter and two soldiers have lost their lives. Other planters who were reported murdered have since made their appearance.
The volunteers and soldiers have captured about one hundred and fifty prisoners, who are being tried by Court Martial to-day.
Three of the ringleaders have just been shot in the Fort yard at Bassin.

Our Special sent us the following at 3:30 this afternoon.
"First three prisoners just shot more it is said will follow to-morrow—Work is being resumed on the estates in this quarter."

(From yesterday's *Lloyds*)
The following extract of a private letter, dated Bassin 7th instant, has been kindly communicated to us:—
"The volunteers are constantly bringing in numerous prisoners in both towns. The rioters are so scared at the consequences of their rising that they themselves detect and hand in their ringleaders."

EXTRACT of a private telegram received here this afternoon:—
"Good news from the country. Burnt works examined by competent Engineers, not irreparable. Damage can be put in order in a few weeks. The bulk of the planters, at first, were undoubtedly panic stricken, and had they only rallied together and done on the 2nd and 3rd inst., what they are doing now, many of the 62 Estates burnt, or more or less damaged, would have been spared, and not unlikely some of them at work gridding to-day."

LATER.
(From the *West India and Panama Telegraph Co.*)
ST. CROIX, 8th October, 3:30 p. m.—Every thing is quiet.

The reported burning of the negro village of Betty's Hope is contradicted.

The fire seen in that direction was Manning's Bay meadows.

Troops and volunteers left Bassin at 7 a. m. to capture the rioters hiding on the north side.

LATER.
Our Special at St. Croix telegraphed to us this afternoon:—
"All quiet. Confidence is being restored throughout the island."
